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# Mezzo-Soprano Wins Scholarship!

The judges were challenged to make the decision among eight talented finalists for the 2002 Pro-Mozart Scholarship award to study at the prestigious Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria this summer. Finalists included four singers, two pianists, a violinist, and a classical guitarist. This was the year of the singers. Magdalena Wór, mezzo-soprano, won first place, and soprano Kendall Marie Kookogey was named second place.



Magdalena Wór, in her second try for the Pro-Mozart Scholarship, won the competition with her lovely vocal clarity and effective interpretation of selections from Mozart, Handel, Bizet, and Saint-Saëns. A junior at Georgia State University, Polish-born Wór graduated from Chattahoochee High School. In addition to her

activities at the Harrower Opera Workshop in Atlanta, and the GSU Opera Workshop, she recently performed the role of Rebecca Nurse in *The Crucible* 

by Robert Ward, and recently won the state and regional Metropolitan Opera Auditions. Impressive accomplishments for a young singer.

Also gracing us with impressive vocalism is Kendall Marie Kookogey, soprano. Her polished voice and stage presence created a memorable performance in music by Mozart, Schumann, and Duparc. Kendall is a graduate of Oberlin Conservatory and the University of Georgia. A winner of several



competitions, Kendall will attend the Mozarteum in the event that Magdalena is unable to attend. The \$4,000 scholarship that Pro-Mozart offers is one of Atlanta's longest running and most lucrative. We are proud to offer this award for over thirty-five years.

# Majoring on



# MOZART

Janice Wong, pianist, and 2001 Pro-Mozart Competition winner returns to the Pro-Mozart Society to perform after spending time in Salzburg, Austria, her prize in winning the competition. Everyone, of course, will be very interested to discover how this wonderful experience has affected her art. It occurred to me, that while this column is called Majoring on Mozart, I will withdraw from Mozart as a subject and briefly discuss how a pianist plans a recital program. To the average listener, very little thought is given to this aspect of giving a concert, however, most performing artists I know want to give their listeners a piogram of diverse music while, simultaneously, showcasing their particular talents with the selected music. For the most part, gone are the days when most pianists give all-Beethoven sonata recitals, or all-Chopin recitals, though they do occur from time-to-time in larger cities where the classical music population is large, such as New York, Vienna, or Berlin. It was a common occurrence with such pianists as Artur Schnabel and Edwin Fischer in years gone by, and interestingly, the recitals were always sold out.

Miss Wong's program is comprised of music from the Baroque, Classical, Romantic and near Contemporary periods, embræing Mozart, Bach, Schubert, Chopin, Tchaikovsky, Prokofiev, and Mompou. In selecting a program with this musical "range," the pianist is exploiting the musical styles of each period, illustrating the preciseness of Bach and Mozart to the more florid and virtuosic music of Chopin and Tchaikovsky, and embracing the impressionistic style of Mompou.

As one listens to Miss Wong perform these various composers, each will be touched differently by her approach to the various styles of music, her mental "connection" with each composer, and of course, the manner in which she negotiates the technical requirements.

The chapters of many books have been devoted exclusively to the art of selecting repertoire for public performance, and it is, indeed, an art! In a brief column such as this, it is impossible to elaborate as much as one would want. Suffice to say that we, as concert-goers, and music lovers, might give more thought to the arrangement of the program and the repertoire selected by the artist. From where we sit in the audience, most of us have little idea of how much time, effort, and musical love is given to please us. In the end, however, we are very often treated to a bit of musical "dessert," when the artist moves ahead to give us an encore or two illustrating yet another aspect of what I call the "three Ps": Programming, Performing, and Reasing! (For the pianist, there is a fourth: Practicing!)\*
