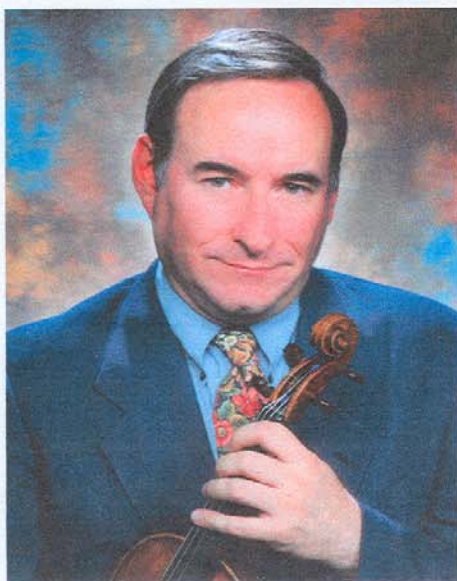
Peter Zazofsky, Violinist, To Perform on March 11 at 3 PM

PETER ZAZOFSKY, Violinist, has enjoyed a career as soloist, chamber musician, and educator spanning 30 countries in five continents. He has performed with many great orchestras in the United States, Europe, and Asia including the Boston Symphony, Berlin Philharmonic, and Philadelphia Orchestra. As a recitalist, he has given programs in Carnegie Hall, Palais de Beaux Arts in Brussels, and the Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires. He has toured the world's music centers as First Violinist of the Muir String Quartet.

Peter was born in Boston where his father was assistant concertmaster of the Boston Symphony. Joseph Silverstein was his first teacher. He later studied with Dorothy Delay, Jaimi Laredo, and Ivan Galamian at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia. Beginning in 1974, Mr. Zazofsky won a series of prizes and awards culminating in the Gold Medal at the 1980 Queen Elizabeth Competition and the Grand Prize of the 1979 Montreal International Competition. Since then, Mr. Zazofsky has made solo appearances with the orchestras of Atlanta, Baltimore, Leipzig, Santiago, Minnesota, and Montreal. He has toured Asia as soloist with the San Francisco Symphony, as well as the U.S. with the Danish Radio Orchestra. He is Associate Professor of Violin at Boston University.



WILLIAM RANSOM, Pianist, has appeared as soloist with orchestras, recitalist, and chamber musician in Europe, Japan, Korea, Mexico, South America, Ireland, and throughout the U.S. His performances have been broadcast on National Public Radio. He has collaborated with musicians such as Yo-Yo Ma, Richard Stoltzman, Robert McDuffie, and members of the Tokyo, Cleveland, American, St. Petersburg and Lark String Quartets. He has performed and given master classes at Yale, Duke, Cornell, MIT, Stanford, and Vanderbilt, among others. He is the Mary Emerson Professor at Emory University where he is head of the Piano Faculty in the Music Department and Artistic Director of the Emory Chamber Music Society of Atlanta. He is a graduate of Julliard and the University of Michigan.

SLAVIC GABINSKY WINS SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION; BEN JACKSON TAKES MEEHAN AWARD

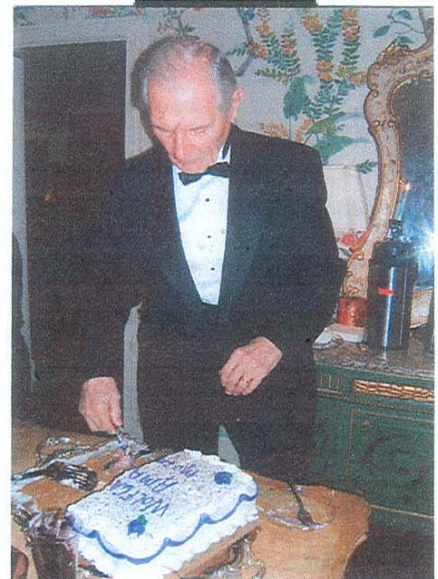
The competition was fierce, but pianist and Emory University grad SLAVIC GABINSKY wowed the judges (and the audience) with his performance of a Mozart sonata and two Rachmaninoff etudes, and emerged as the winner of the 2007 scholarship competition held on Feb.25. He will attend the Mozarteum in Salzburg this summer on a \$4,000 scholarship and return to us for a concert in the spring of 2008. Clarinetist and University of Georgia senior BEN JACKSON won the Edward F. Meehan award for outstanding stage presence, and received a check for \$250.
